# **About USB (University of South Bohemia)**

**The University of South Bohemia in České Budějovice** is a public university founded in 1991. It comprises eight faculties and a university institute, namely the Pedagogical Faculty, the Faculty of Agriculture, the Faculty of Economics, the Faculty of Philosophy, the Faculty of Science, the Faculty of Theology, the Faculty of Health and Social Studies and the newly founded Faculty of Fishery and Water Protection. The ninth body of the university is the Institute of Physical Biology in Nové Hrady. We are a research university focusing mainly on natural sciences, social sciences, and humanities. Recent surveys have shown the university to be most successful in science and research, lifelong learning, and its ability to focus on regional issues.
